Good Evening Everyone! I hope you are all having a fun night. My name is Jamie Lemus and I am 18 years old I am currently a senior at Flintridge Sacred Heart Academy in La Canada. I would like to wish all of the other candidates the best of luck; you are great eagle teammates and anyone of us will all make an amazing **ambassador** for this great organization. This position requires perseverance, dedication and leadership skills. I stand before you this evening because I want to be Miss California Ranger 2012.

I have grown up around the barn and began riding at 4 yrs old. My dad used to play polo and every weekend we would load the trailer up with the horses and drive to a local polo arena in Lake View Terrace. Little did I know that next door to the arena was the home of the California Rangers.

Five years ago one of my dad's polo friends, Captain Marcus Kimura encouraged me to join the Rangers. I was initially hesitant about Rangers because they used rental horses. In 2007 I had earned Rider of the Year for the California, Nevada, and Arizona region by competing on my own horse in Morgan Horse Circuit. I thought a rider without her own horse was less committed to riding. Turns out I was wrong. Riding rental horses has made me a more skilled rider.
